BACKGROUND

The Franklin County Board of Commissioners established the Reentry Advisory Board (RAB) on November 6, 2018, to:

- 1. Develop diverse solutions and policy recommendations to the challenges and barriers that hinder justice-involved residents' access to equal and equitable opportunities and
- 2. Build a culture and platform that promotes inclusion of justice-involved residents in business and the workforce, housing, education, and all aspects of a productive community, and leverage collective knowledge across multiple disciplines.

The overarching goal of the RAB is to support reduction in the recidivism rate in Franklin County thereby positively impacting public safety, social justice, and economic development. Currently the RAB includes 20 members representing diverse perspectives and expertise from various sectors of the community. In addition, there are 15 individuals that contribute their expertise on committees. The Franklin County Office of Justice Policy and Programs (OJPP) provides support and assistance to the RAB. Reentry has been recognized as an important issue in Franklin County for years as research on reentry began to inform practice and the number of incarcerated individuals began to grow nationally in the 1980's, peaking in the 2000's. Prior to establishment of the RAB, the Reentry Coalition was in operation from 2009 to 2019 with the stated purpose of establishing system-wide justice and reentry planning and the facilitation of multi-agency engagement across disciplines.

2023 STRATEGIC PLANNING

Franklin County OJPP determined the development of a RAB Strategic Plan was needed to refocus efforts around reentry. A consultant was selected to facilitate the planning process which included the following:

- Oversight by a management team with OJPP staff and the consultant
- Twelve interviews of selected board members and staff
- A survey circulated to all board and committee members
- A one-day retreat with staff and the RAB facilitated by the consultant
- Development of a three-year Strategic Plan

The confidential, individual Zoom interviews incorporated 15 questions addressing the status of reentry in Franklin County, RAB operations, and the strategic planning process. Based on the results of the interviews, an 11-question survey was circulated to further explore the themes

uncovered in the interviews. The retreat was held on Friday, June 9, 2023, at the Columbus Metropolitan Library with thirty-six attending (Attachment A). It included presentations by Franklin County leadership and the consultant and extensive facilitated discussions resulting in consensus on the main components of the Strategic Plan. For instance, it was agreed that the RAB vision and mission should be updated to be more concise and incorporate the following concepts:

- Opportunity to contribute
- Safer neighborhoods
- Well-being
- Inclusion

Staff, the consultant, and selected RAB members utilized the input at the retreat to further define and develop the Strategic Plan for final approval by the RAB in September 2023.

STATUS OF REENTRY & RAB OPERATIONS

Information gathering in the strategic planning process revealed key findings on the status of reentry in Franklin County and the operation of the RAB as summarized below.

Though there were some interesting dichotomies in these findings (i.e., data was listed as a strength in reentry overall, but a challenge for RAB operations); several themes emerged that frame the major issues addressed at the retreat, including the following:

- Existing service system improvement around coordination, collaboration, and accessibility from the perspective of the provider and user
- Innovations in services, policies, communications, and engagement
- Data collection, evaluation, and research to support strong outcomes
- RAB operations more clearly defined, and Franklin County staffing expanded

STRATEGIC DIRECTION

The organizing principle of the 2023 – 2025 Franklin County Reentry Strategic Plan is "Transforming Reentry through Innovation, Collaboration, and Data-Driven Decisions" while ensuring the voice of residents impacted by our justice system guides our approach. The plan is designed to focus the reentry work of the Franklin County Board of Commissioners (BOC) and their staff along with oversight from the RAB to advance community well-being by assisting justice-system impacted individuals, families, and neighborhoods in new and improved ways. In order to achieve this transformation, the RAB and Franklin County will be guided by the following values:

• **Excellence**: Holistic services that utilize best practices.

• **Engagement**: Guidance from impacted individuals and agencies.

• **Respect**: Understanding and compassion.

• <u>Integrity</u>: Honesty and the highest level of ethical conduct.

• <u>Fairness</u>: Equity, diversity, and inclusion.

• <u>Commitment</u>: Financial resources and technical expertise provided.

• Accountable: Efficient operations and positive outcomes.

The strategic direction to be pursued is defined below.

GOAL 1: To build and sustain a system of services that is traumainformed, equitable, and human-centric with accountability measures for service providers.

- **Objective A.** Create an inventory of existing reentry services.
- **Objective B.** Develop a Care Coordination Network for capacity building, accountability, and information sharing.
- **Objective C.** Establish Center of Excellence to support the standards and practices for those transitioning from incarceration.

GOAL 2: To promote innovation in reentry policies, services, and communications in response to the changing realities of the community and populations served.

- **Objective A:** Implement a marketing and education campaign to replace community stigma with acceptance and equal opportunities for returning citizens.
- **Objective B:** Enact policies that remove barriers to successful reintegration into families and the community.
- **Objective C:** Establish new services that address unmet needs by executing prevention and intervention efforts including pre-trial diversion which avoids incarceration (i.e., Tap In Center)

GOAL 3: To gather and circulate information that reflects the voices of those most impacted, assesses the effectiveness of the current service system, and identifies improvements to be enacted.

- **Objective A:** Create a comprehensive database that allows for real-time, relevant information sharing to inform policy, practice, and day-to-day decision making.
- **Objective B:** Conduct and circulate an annual literature review of juvenile and criminal justice best practices.
- **Objective C:** Obtain the opinions of key stakeholders on reentry needs, services, and improvements.

GOAL 4: To strengthen the structure and influence of the Reentry Advisory Board and Franklin County staff to ensure a dynamic reentry system is operating.

Objective A: Make changes to the RAB Bylaws to clarify operations, reflect the current reentry landscape, and the values of the RAB.

Objective B: Align and monitor Franklin County government, contract services, and associated resources to maximize efficiency and effectiveness.

Objective C: Publish an annual report to the Board of Commissioners and the community that outlines accomplishments and recommended improvements in the reentry system.

The RAB will lend their time, expertise, and guidance to Franklin County staff and the community in general to support successful implementation of the Reentry Strategic Plan. To realize full implementation of the Strategic Plan, broad responsibilities are listed below.

• The RAB commits to:

✓ Consistent guidance in the adoption of the RAB Strategic Plan to ensure implementation by Franklin County Office of Justice Policy & Programs and key stakeholders.

Staff commits to:

✓ Execution of the Strategic Plan and RAB structure to ensure progressive movement and completion of goals and objectives.

BOC commits to:

✓ Support the Franklin County Reentry Advisory Board by providing necessary resources and accountability to ensure the Strategic Plan is fully incorporated and sustainable for residents and their families.

Together these entities will strengthen the engagement of those most directly impacted by the justice system starting with full engagement in community conversations and participation in RAB Work Groups.

IMPLEMENTATION

A structure that ensures successful implementation of the Reentry Strategic Plan requires clearly defined management, oversight, and accountability, as explained below.

Critical Preliminary Actions

Prior to the beginning of the formal implementation of the 2024 – 2026 Strategic Plan, an action-oriented phase will operate from October – December 2023 including the following steps:

- Issue a press release on the plan.
- Post the plan, a short video conversation on reentry, and an invitation to a Big Table Talk on the Franklin County website.
- Conduct a Big Table Talk with those directly impacted.
- Finalize Strategic Plan Executive Committee and Work Group membership, set meeting schedules, and finalize initial work plans so that all activities are integrated and coordinated, avoiding duplication of efforts.
- Update RAB Bylaws including the vision and mission of the RAB along with the committee structure in light of the Strategic Plan Work Groups.
- Define roles and responsibilities of key actors, including development of job descriptions for existing and future staff and RAB leadership and members.
- Obtain BOC approval of the Strategic Plan and updates to the RAB Bylaws.
- Ensure education about the Strategic Plan and coordination with ongoing justice-focused initiatives in Franklin County and Ohio.
- Schedule and prepare for the community-wide release to the Strategic Plan in January 2024.

Transparent Communications

Since reentry affects the entire Franklin County community, the BOC, OJPP, and RAB will offer annual community conversations on reentry and a special session on the release of the Strategic Plan in January 2024. The scope and nature of reentry in Franklin County, best practices, and the content of the Strategic Plan will be presented at the opening session. Interactive discussions will be conducted to obtain the perspectives of those in attendance helping to further inform Franklin County leadership. Subsequent annual community sessions will be conducted in April, Second Chance Month, to report on Strategic Plan progress with

intentional facilitation of dialogue to ensure consistent engagement. RAB members will assist in obtaining attendance at these sessions by inviting their respective agency members, community organizations, and partners to attend. Finally, OJJP staff will also conduct an annual presentation on reentry and the Strategic Plan for relevant Franklin County staff and contract agencies.

Reentry Strategic Plan Executive Committee (SPEC)

Ruchelle Pride, Director OJPP, will serve as Chairperson of the SPEC. A primary function of the SPEC is to develop a budget for implementation of the Strategic Plan and obtain needed resources. Bi-monthly meetings will be held to review and discuss progress; identify strategies to overcome barriers to implementation; ensure coordination of efforts to avoid duplication; provide direction to the Strategic Plan Work Groups; and update the plan to address emergent issues, as needed. A quarterly dashboard report will be generated to summarize progress. The SPEC membership will also include OJPP Chief Operating Officer, Deputy Director of Justice Services, Reentry Services Coordinator, and the RAB members assigned to lead each Work Group.

Reentry Strategic Plan Work Groups

A Work Group will be established for each goal. A Work Plan (attachment B) will be developed, updated, and followed to provide focus. A RAB member will serve as Lead and an OJPP staff member will be assigned to support the work of the Work Group and to lead implementation of that goal. Membership will be comprised of selected RAB Board and Committee members and those with lived experience. Regularly scheduled meetings will be held to review Strategic Plan progress and implementation; identify strategies to overcome barriers; and update the Work Plans, as needed. In addition, a quarterly progress report will be submitted to the SPEC.

Reporting

Consistent reporting will document progress and ensure accountability. A quarterly progress report (Attachment C) for each Work Group will be completed by the assigned staff person and submitted to the SPEC one week prior to the meeting date. The SPEC will complete the Quarterly Dashboard Report (Attachment D) no later than one week after each meeting, circulate to Franklin County leadership, and post on the OJPP website.
